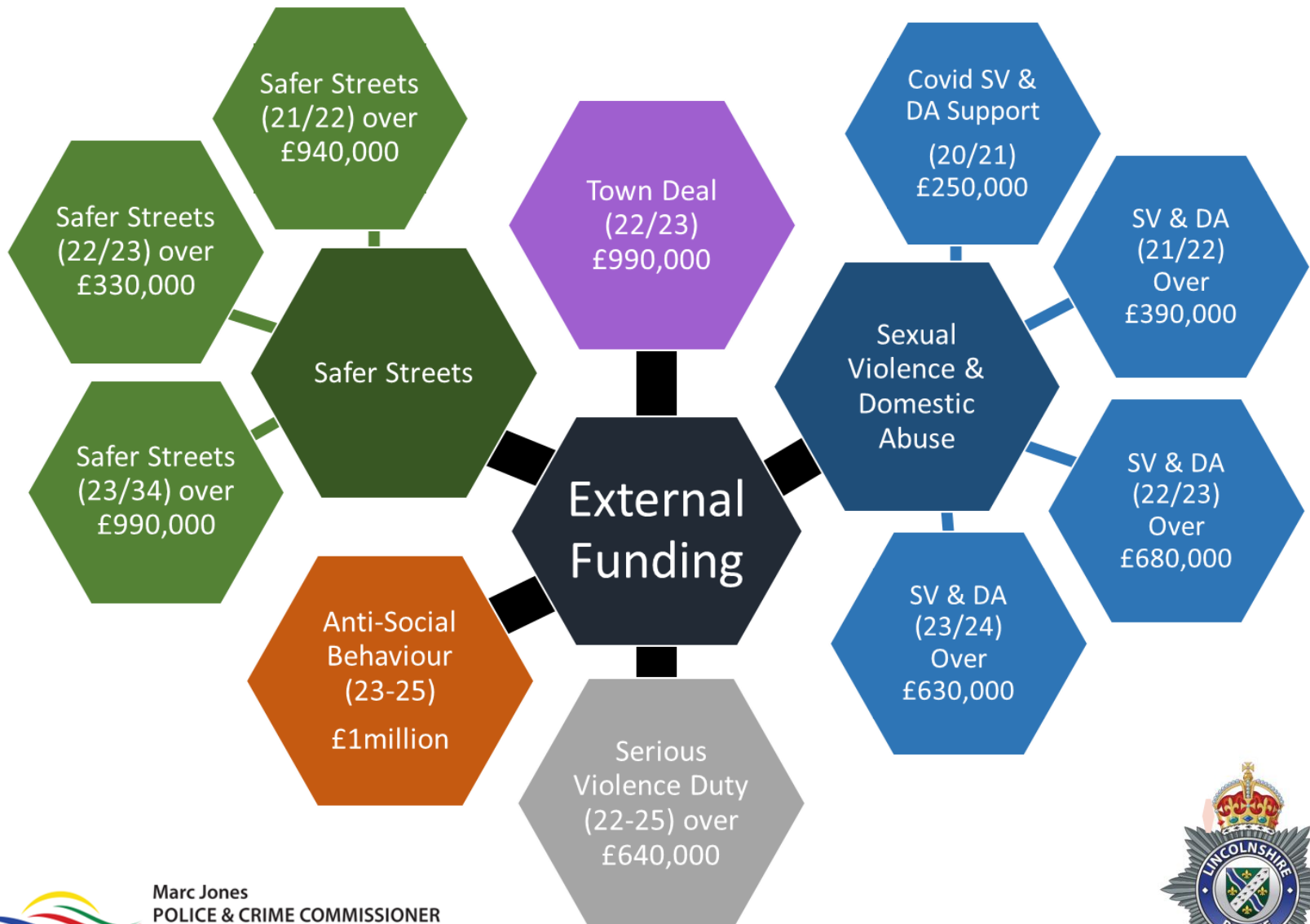

HELP THOSE IN NEED



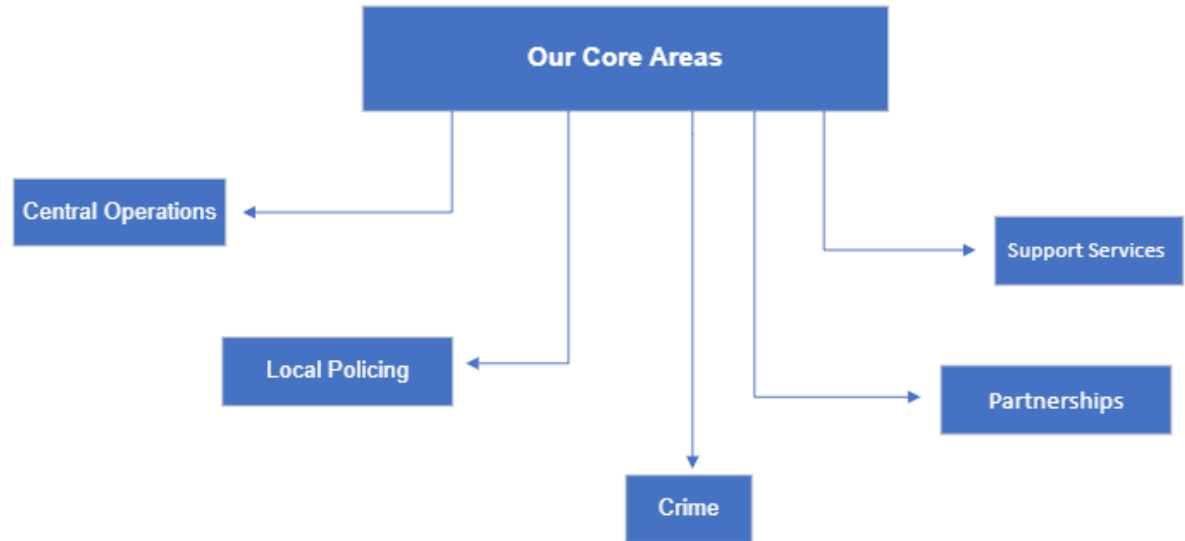
- We will be people focused and offer the highest standard of care with sustained reductions in repeat calls for service

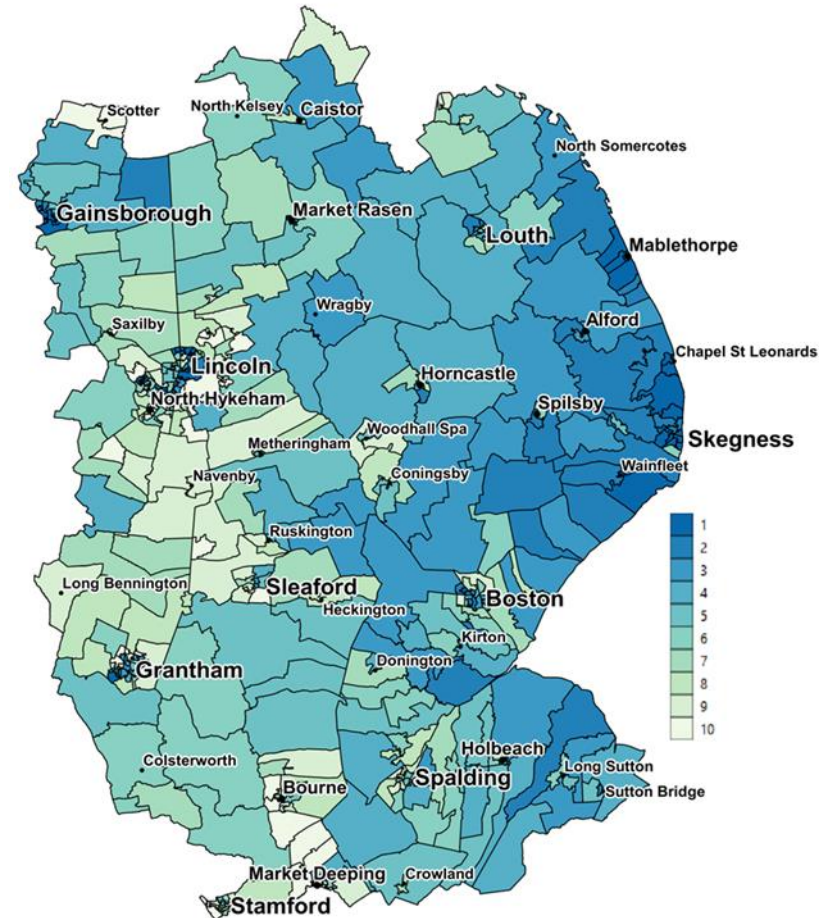
Challenges

Deprivation in Lincolnshire

- The areas of highest deprivation in Lincolnshire can be found in pockets of the major towns and along the coast
- The most deprived area in Lincolnshire can be found in **Gainsborough South West**. It is the 24th most deprived neighbourhood out of 32,844 LSOAs in England
- The second and third most deprived areas in the county can be found in **Skegness** and **Chapel St Leonards**

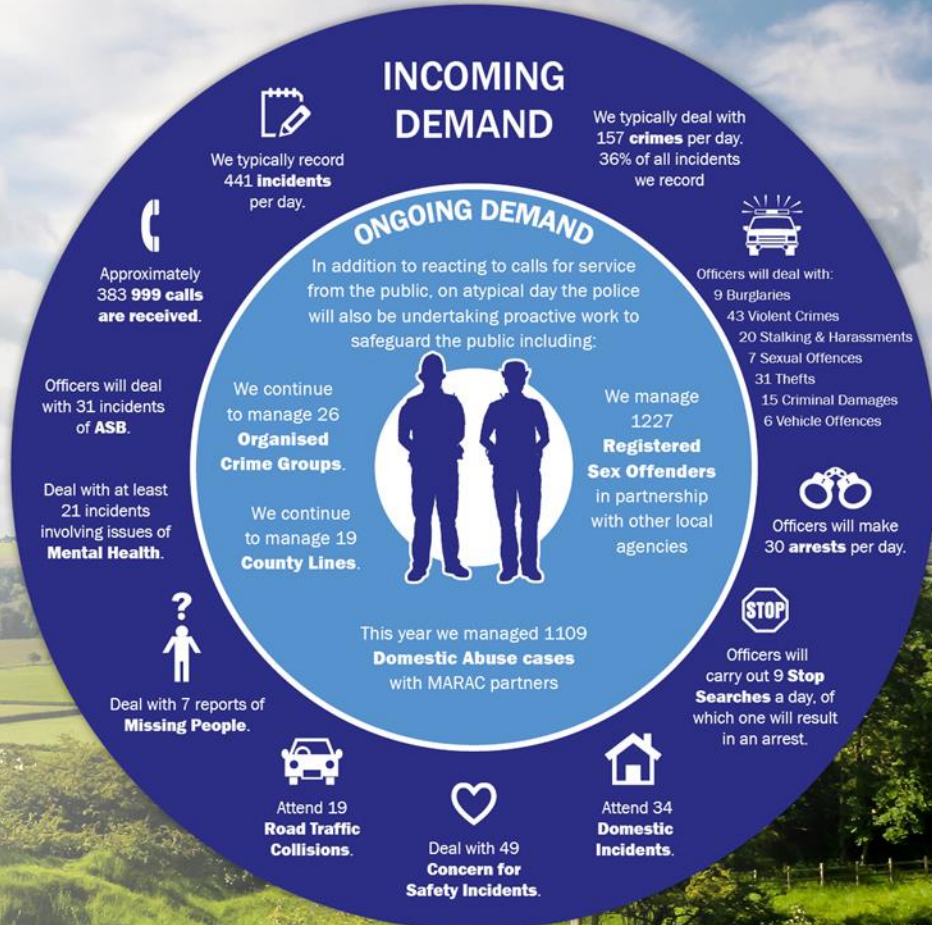


A TYPICAL DAY IN THE LIFE OF LINCOLNSHIRE POLICE

Neighbourhood Policing Focus

The Statistical Process Charts (SPC) are graphs used to study how a process changes over time. The main aims of using SPC charts are to understand what is 'different' and what is 'normal'.

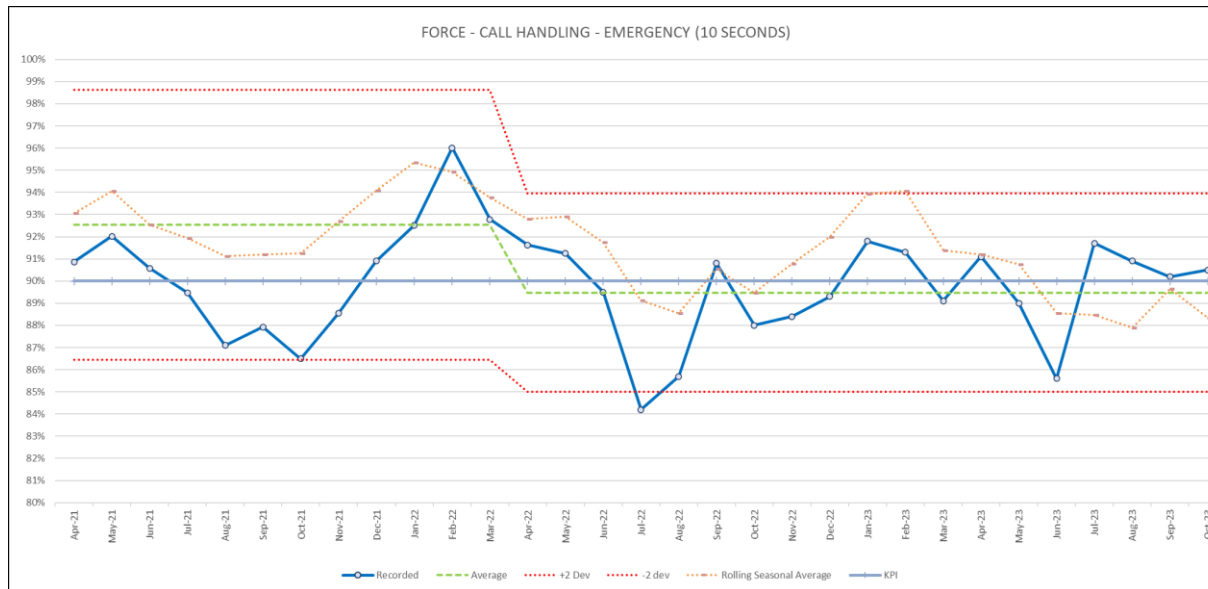
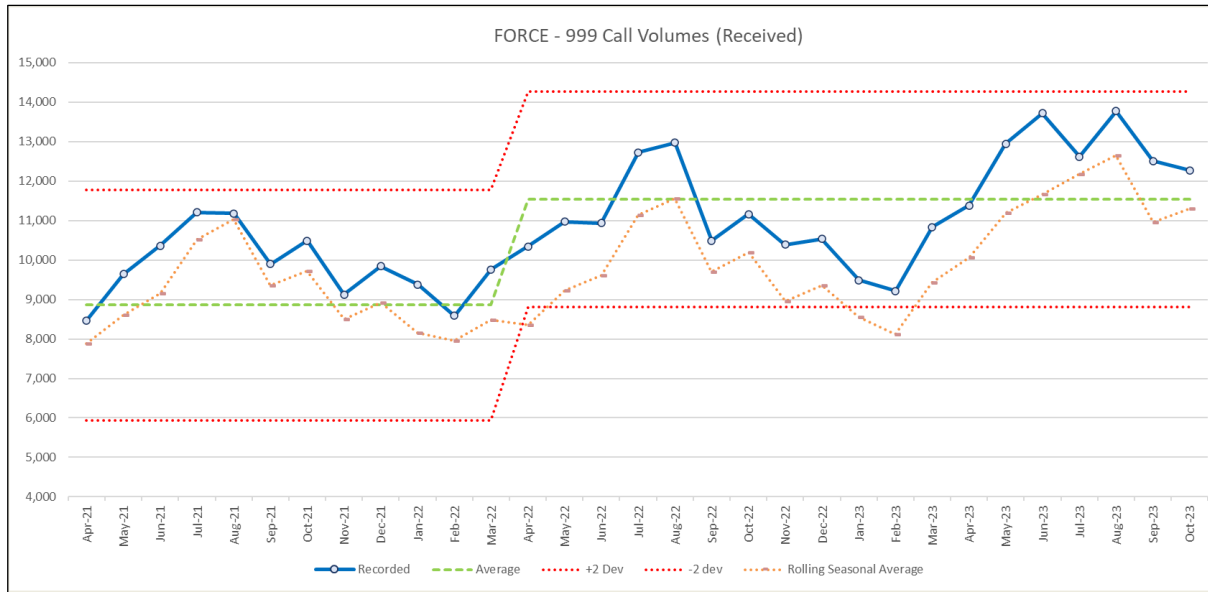
SPC charts require a minimum of 10 data points in order to create a valid chart, although there is increased reliability when using 20 or more data points. Data should also be plotted chronologically in date or process order, usually shown as distinct data points. The following are then calculated:

- 1) Average (mean) based on the previous rolling 36 months to end of the current / most recent reporting month. Any data sets that do not have a full 36 months, use the entire available data set, until a full 3 years are available.
- 2) Standard Deviations used to determine how far a value is from the mean. The SPC charts are set to two standard deviations.
- 3) Seasonal averages are based on the same month for the last 3 years, including the most recent year. For example, the seasonal average for October 2023 is calculated from the average of October 2021 , October 2022 and October 2023.

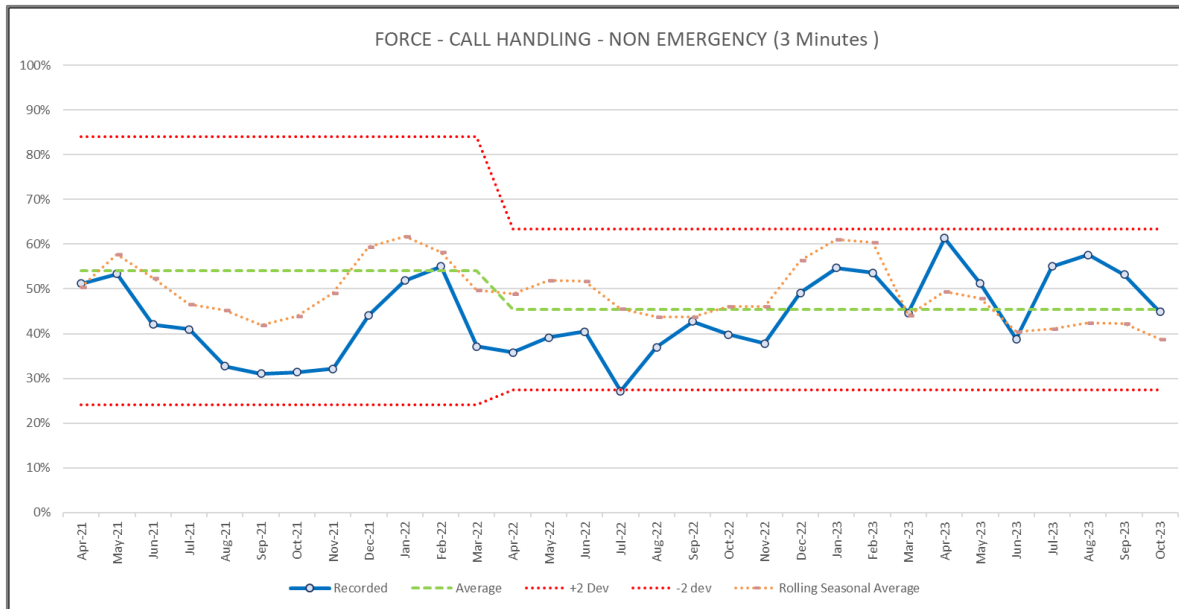
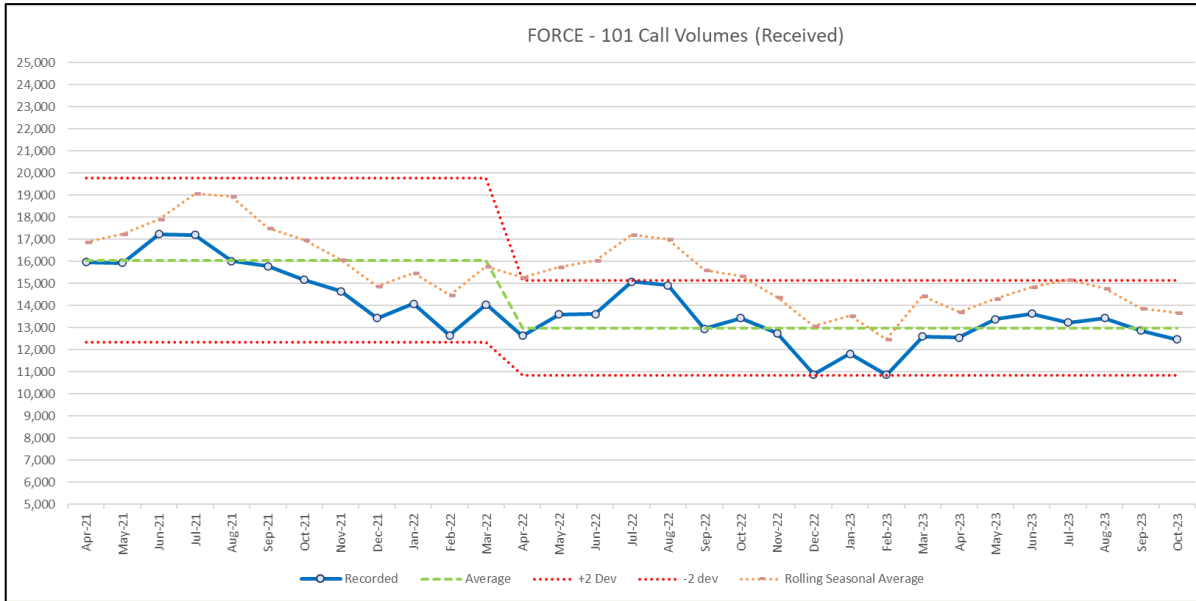
Note the tolerance levels have been re-set as the level of offending has returned to pre-covid levels



Force Call Handling - 999

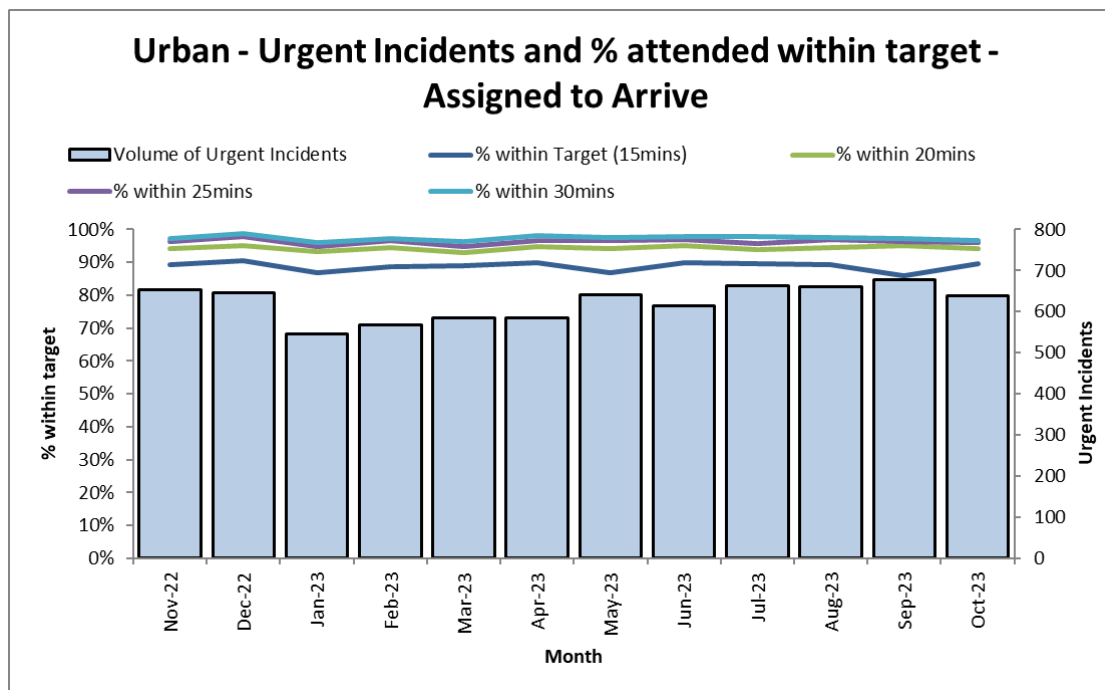


Force Call Handling - 101



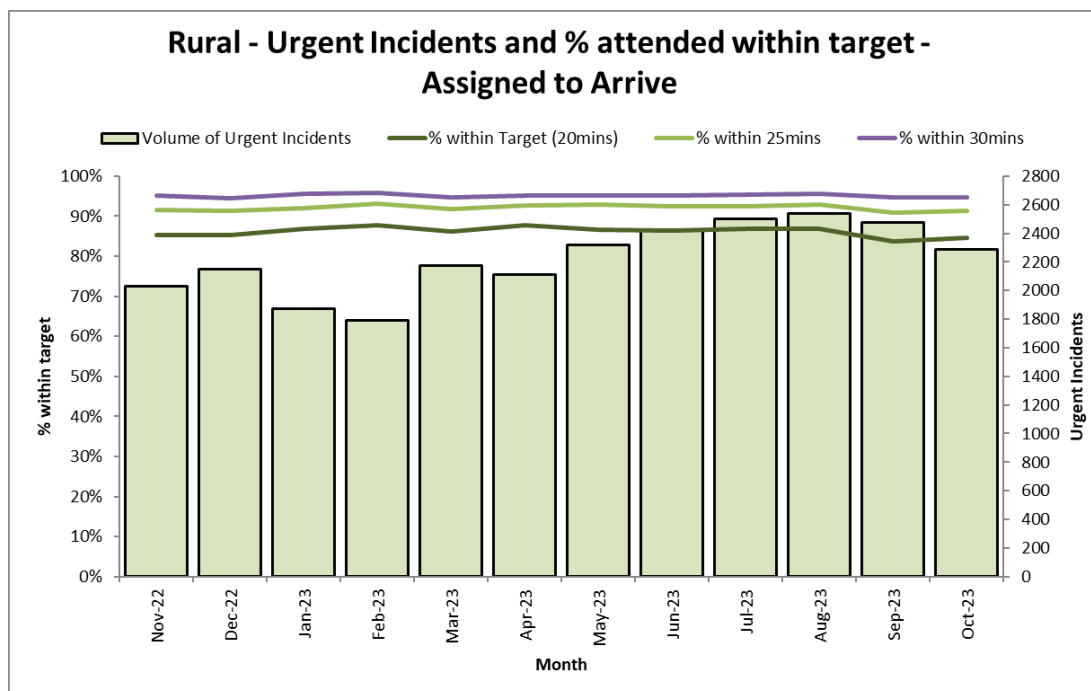

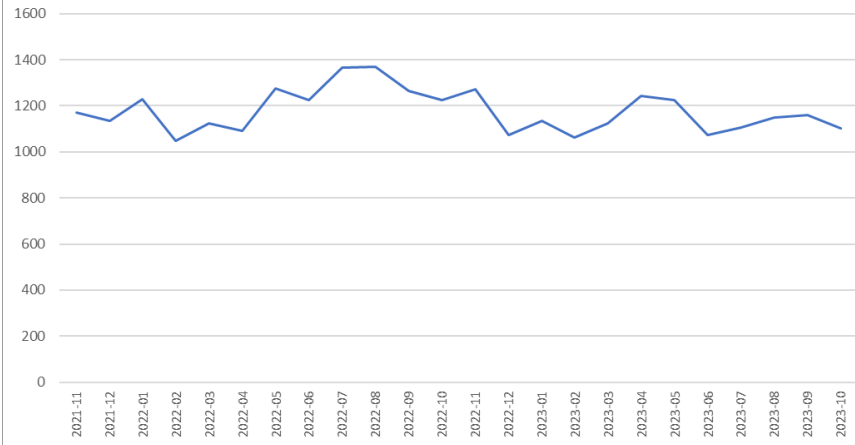

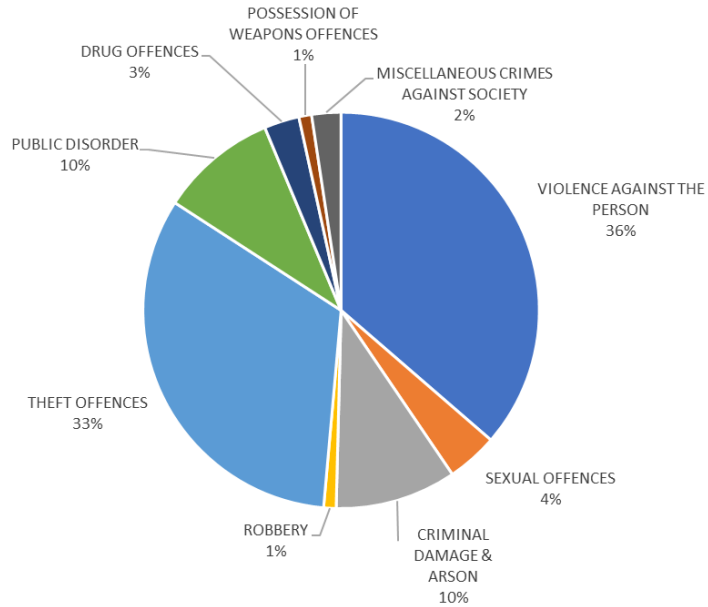

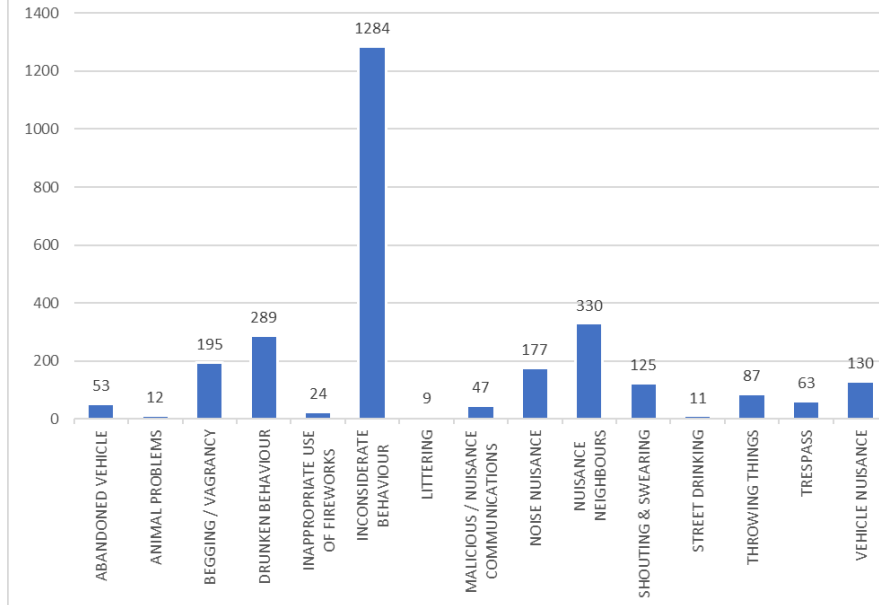

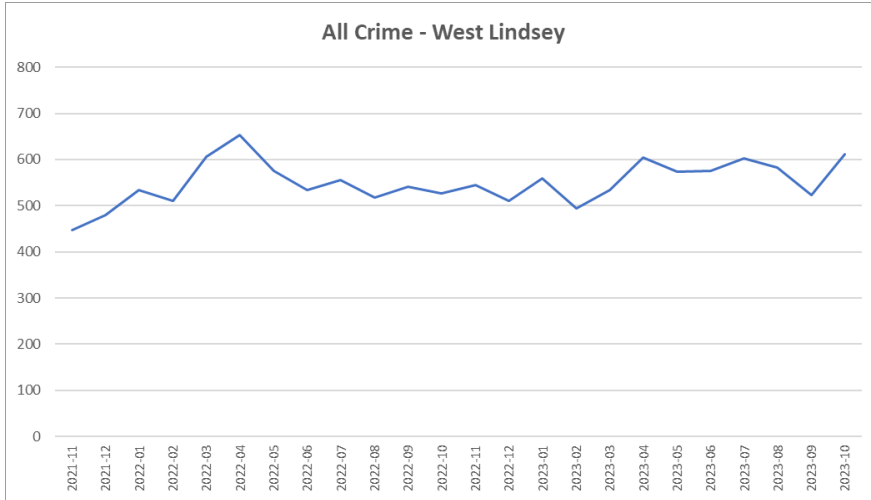

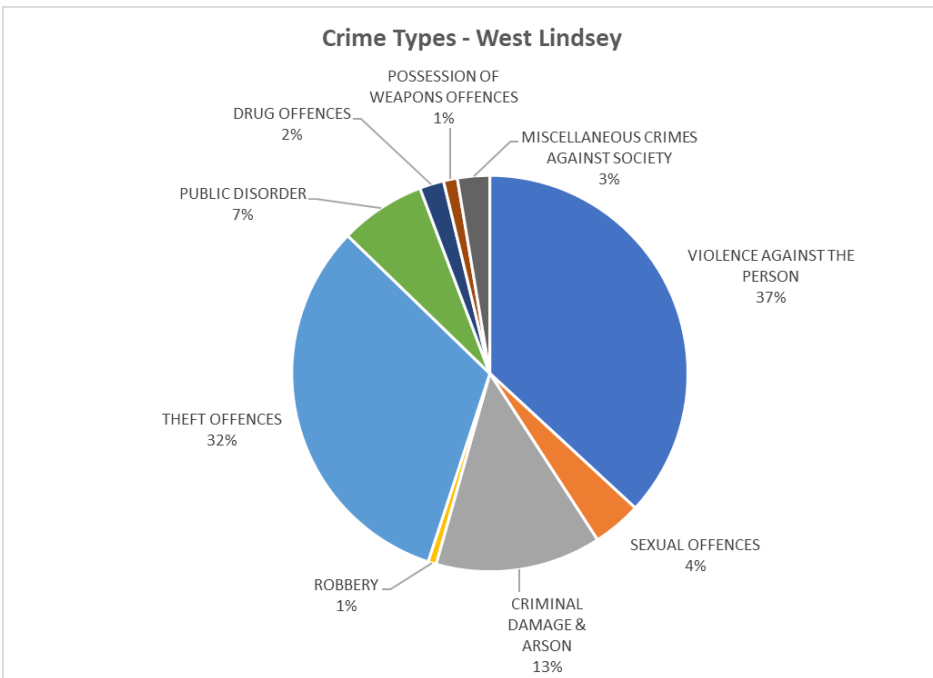

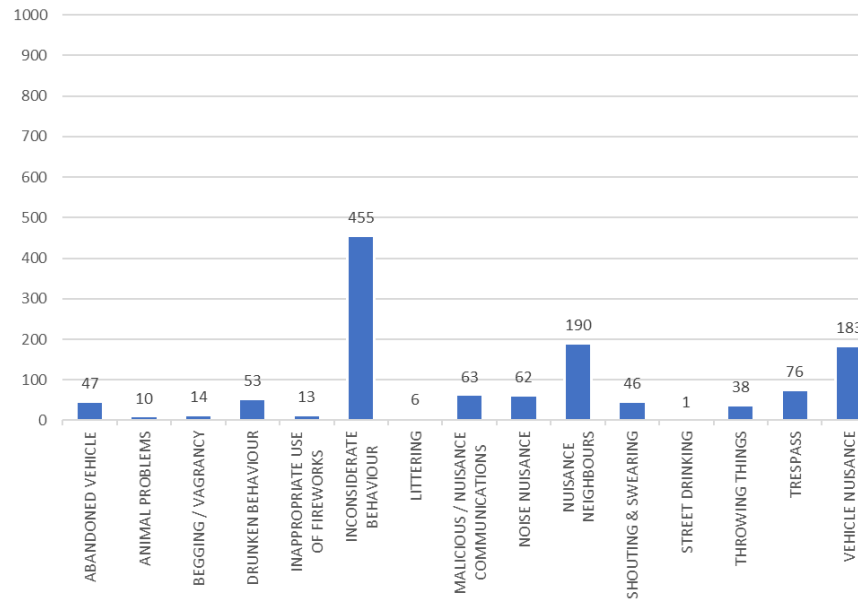

Priorities

- Gainsborough Rural North – ASB around Scotter Village Hall
- Gainsborough Town North – ASB at Richmond Park
- Gainsborough South West Ward – Class A drug Supply, Cannabis grows and Repeat shoplifters
- Gainsborough Uphills – Moped ASB, ASB at Park Springs
- Gainsborough Rural South – Fatal 4
- Welton / Hemswell – ASB Manor Park
- Nettleham / Cherry Willingham – Fatal 4
- Market Rasen – ASB Town Centre & Fatal 4
- Caistor – Fatal 4



Updates

- CBM now in post for Gainsborough Rural North and Uphill
- Burglary offence down on previous 12 month
- 30 warrants executed in last 12 months for Class A drugs and Cannabis grows with every single one producing results
- Hot spot patrols to target ASB at Richmond Park
- Hot Spot Patrols at Scotter Village Hall
- Fatal 4 set as a priority in response to speeding issues raised.
- High Harm / persistent offenders targeted and CBOs sought

City of Lincoln

Lincoln North

- 1) Youth ASB – to include Sudbrook Drive and the community Centre & any identified hotspots
- 2) Drug related ASB / Violence

Park and Abbey

- 1) Illegal drug use / supply – Monks Rd area and Sincil Bank

Lincoln City Centre

- 1) Drug related ASB lower High Street, including the Methodist Church and Begging in the area and breaches of PSPO

Lincoln Carholme

- 1) Drug related ASB – linked to CLs, targeting problematic addresses

Lincoln South

- 1) Speeding Boultham Park Rd & Birchwood Avenue
- 2) Youth ASB – particularly around McColls on Turner Avenue and any further identified hotspots.



Speeding

- RPU and ARVs target identified collision hotspots with speed as a contributing factor.
- Identified as one of the Fatal 5 so priority for all Officers to enforce when available to do so.
- Lincolnshire Road Safety Partnership carry out speed enforcement at identified sites in line with Department of Transport Guidance
- Lincolnshire Road Safety Partnership can be contacted to consider a site for Speed Enforcement
- Community Speed Watch
- Work with Highways to engineer out collisions caused by Speed



Parking

- Parking is now a civil offence so no longer enforced by Police responsibility for this is the County Council
- Police will only be involved if vehicle position is causing an immediate danger to other Road Users.
- If vehicles are parking illegally can report to County Council parking enforcement team
- If communities want parking restrictions on Roads the County Council are the authority to contact
